In Nursery we have loved celebrating lots of different festivals and holidays throughout the year. Christmas, Diwali, Chinese New Year to name a few.



our class runner bean didn't fare quite so well!


















Maths


1E 2020—2021

Autumn 1

The year started with our topic 'We are One'. It began with us thinking about where we live and what countries make up the United Kingdom. We located the countries on a map and thought about what it meant to be united. Our story for the half term was the Three Little Pigs. In science we made houses using different materials and thought about the properties of each of them. We found out which materials made good houses and which ones were not so good.

Spring 1

Spring 1 saw another half term of home learning. We all managed to use Seesaw effectively to learn about the great ship Titanic. We especially enjoyed learning about the different classes on the Titanic and created some amazing descriptive writing about what the dining room would be like. Another one of our favourite lessons was learning about the music they listened to. It inspired so many of us to have a go at learning the waltz and an Irish jig.





Summer 1

Our 'Flourishing Me' topic saw us learn about the seasons and what the word flourishing means. We talked about how we can help each other to flourish and how we can help plants flourish. In science we found out about deciduous and evergreen trees. We went on lots of walks around our school grounds and the local area to spot the different trees and signs of the seasons.

off our learning in Spring 2. We had a special virtual visit from a zoo keeper at Chester Zoo who told us about the different animal classes and the features of nocturnal animals. We also started our first Talk for Writing text 'The Lazy Lion'. We learnt actions to retell the story and then had a go at creating our own version called 'The Lazy Zebra'





1M2020-21

In our first topic we learnt all about the countries that make up the United Kingdom, thinking about how we are united as one. We explored some of the features of the different countries, including their capital cities and flags.

In English, we read a range of traditional tales, summarising and performing them on our class stage. We learnt the story of 'The Three Little Pigs' and used our story map to rewrite it.




Next we developed our ability to empathise when learning about the Great Fire of London. First we became historians, thinking about how London has changed since 1666 to the present day. We ordered the key events of the fire and considered the materials that the houses had been built out of and how this caused the fire to spread. We then built our own London townhouses in DT and recreated the fire in school. Using Samuel Pepys' diary as inspiration, we wrote our own diaries to share our experiences during 'The Great Fire of Allerton!' We also created brilliant fire collages, exploring how to mix colours, and combine different textures.

During Spring 1, many of us were learning from home. The children worked incredibly hard with their remote learning, discovering all about collaboration in the Life Savers topic.

Parling was when she rescued survivors from a shipwreck. We read the story Samson's Titanic Journey which was full of exciting vocabulary and taught us about what life was like for passengers in 1st, 2nd and 3rd class aboard the Titanic. We explored the different classes further through dance and music, practising an Irish jig and a ballroom waltz.



Kingdom in Spring 2. We loved learning lots of incredible facts about different animals and wrote amazing non-chronological reports about wolves and lions. We also took part in a fascinating virtual workshop about nocturnal animals, led by Chester Zoo. The children showed off their story writing skills when writing their innovated versions of the story 'The Lazy Lion.' After learning about the diet of different animals, we created bird seed balls to feed the wildlife in school.

We have also worked extremely hard as

mathematicians this year. We have learnt how to read, write and compare numbers to 100, to use number bonds to 20 to add and subtract and to solve word problems. We have really enjoyed taking part in several maths mornings where we immersed ourselves in different maths activities, such as measuring tasks inspired by the book '356 Penguins.'

In Science this year, we have

explored different materials and their properties, learnt about the parts of the human body, classified animals according to their characteristics, and discovered how to identify common plants and trees. We have also learnt about seasonal changes throughout the year, observing what has happened to the plants and trees in the school grounds and noticing differences in weather.



2A 2020-21

Autumn 1

At the start of Year 2, we learnt all about Leeds and how it has developed and changed over time. We learnt about the River Aire, how it changes from the source at Malham Tarn to the wide industrial areas in Leeds and Bradford. We also learnt about the diversity of the modern Leeds music scene, listening to the music from local musicians such as Opera North, New World Steel Pans and the Kaiser Chiefs.

In English we looked at the stories of Anthony Browne where we met characters like Willy and Hugh. These characters taught us how to be kind and how friendships can develop in unlikely places.

As scientists, we looked at different animals and the habitats that they need to survive. We also looked at how animals have adapted to the amazing places that they live.

As artists, we created multimedia pieces that celebrated the silky web habitats that spiders weave and create.


Our first half term together in Year 2 also featured many hours spent outside in our amazing school grounds, exploring what nature has to offer as well as building team work skills.

In 2A, we always face every challenge head on, so when we were plunged into another national lockdown in the bitterly cold months of early 2021 we used Seesaw to learn, connect, showcase and celebrate our amazing home learning. Our learning journey during most of the closure was focussed on incredible explorers from across the globe and throughout history. Together we learnt about Captain Cook and Neil Armstrong, then the children created their own projects about other courageous explorers including Mae Jemison, Matthew Henson and Amelia Earhart. They also made some AMAZING snowmen, in some of the deepest and thickest snow we had ever seen!

In Spring 2 we became poets. We learnt, recited and retold 'The Owl and the Pussycat' by Edward Lear with confidence and vigour. When we all returned to the classroom we found out what happened next in 'The Further Adventures of The Owl and the Pussycat' by Julia Donaldson. It was so amazing to be back together, we wrote stories, made 3D collages and cooked delicious pea green soup.



Summer Term brought more joy to our classroom. We were fascinated by the natural world during our science lessons, in which we learnt about plants. We looked closely at seeds and even grew our own plants around school.

Our art work in Summer 1 was a real moment of triumph. We were inspired by the work of Yorkshire born artist and botanist, James Bolton. We created mixed media observations of different plants and flowers. The finished products were truly sensational.

In Summer 2, we were excited to learn the story of Kassim and the Greedy Dragon! This thrilling story provided us with so much to enjoy and learn from. As historians, we learnt about Wonderful Women. We looked at the amazing work of women in healthcare and compared the well-known, Florence Nightingale, to the lesser known, Nellie Spindler.

We have, once again, had to overcome so much this year As always, in 2A, we have done it together.

Autumn Term

The year started with our 'Leodis to Leeds' Topic. This began with us using our geography skills to locate Leeds on a map. We located the River Aire and the towns and cities it passes through from its source in Malham to its mouth. We looked closer at the city of Leeds identifying the physical and human geographical features of the city looking closely at the Cuthbert Broderick buildings. In History we compared and contrasted modern day Leeds with the past and how buildings such as the Corn Exchange are used now and then.

'Kolkata the city of Joy' was our overarching topic in Autumn 2. The topic compared Kolkata to Leeds in terms of culture, weather, food, transport, tourism, housing and employment. We also compared the River Ganges to the River Aire and took part in debates over whether the River Ganges should be cleaned up. We discovered more about the life of a Rickshaw Puller and wrote some fantastic diary entries. In cooking we enjoyed tasting different curries and also made our own! We created some wonderful Rangoli art work and in groups we designed and made our own bridges. In reading we read various traditional Indian fables such as The Cracked Pot.

Spring Term

Spring 1 saw you ALL as Home Learning Heroes! 'To the four corners of the earth and beyond' led the way for our learning about the famous explorers Captain Cook and Neil Armstrong. Through learning about Captain Cook we deepened our understanding about the world's continents, oceans and learnt more about the countries visited and the people Captain Cook met whilst on his voyages.

Following on from this, this we learnt about Neil Armstrong and the Apollo missions to the moon. This included sequencing events and discussing the contribution these explorers have made to society. We finished the topic with a fantastic explorer project where the pupils created a fact file about an explorer of their choice.

Spring 2 saw us hooking with the classic poem 'The Owl and the Pussycat' and the Julia Donaldson tale 'The Further Adventures of the Owl and the Pussycat'. We carried out research about owls and created some wonderful owl fact files. The children took part in 'who did it?' debates using persuasive language and writing to describe which character stole the ring! We created some fantastic 3D art work of the owl and the pussy cat and the children enjoyed making and tasting pea green soup and learnt and played with lots of new vocabulary from the poem.



























Summer Term

In Summer 1 we hooked with the text 'Meerkat Mail' by Emily Gravett. We used our geography skills to locate the setting of the story - the Kalahari Desert using an atlas. We became meerkat experts using various research methods finding out information about a meerkat's appearance, diet and habitat. We then created some fact filled non chronological reports. Through our Talk 4 Writing we retold the story orally, performing with actions. We then wrote our very own innovated versions of the story 'Meerkat Mail'.

In Summer 2 we were ACE Historians learning about 'Wonderful Women'. We learnt about the lives and achievements of nurses Florence Nightingale and Nellie Spindler and compared their lives and the recognition that they both received for their achievements. English lessons saw us hooking with the story 'Kassim and the greedy dragon'. We made some fantastic dragon puppets and produced exceptionally high quality writing. A wonderful way to end our year 2 learning journey.

Autumn Term...

We were all very excited to return back to school in September and be reunited with our friends. Despite most of us having such a long time away from school, we quickly settled into Year 2 and were eager to begin our new topics.

In science, we explored different **habitats** and found out how some animals are adapted to live in extreme temperatures. We were fascinated to find out about **nocturnal animals** and even set up our own investigation to find out which animals visit our school grounds during the night. We also worked collaboratively to create some mini-beast hotels. We were very happy to find that some had visitors including: woodlice, worms, slugs and ants.

Our history learning required us to travel back to a time when **Leeds** was actually called **Leodis**. We used our enquiry skills to find out how the city has changed over time and compared it to how it looks today. Studying the work of John Atkinson Grimshaw definitely helped us to visualise how our city once looked and we produced some excellent art work of our own.

In PE, we even had a go at doing some Bollywood dancing which was great fun!


Spring Term...

We worked collaboratively, just like Team Ant, to research meerkats before writing some informative non-chronological reports of our own. We focused on a meerkat's appearance, diet and habitat.

We thoroughly enjoyed this story and all worked very hard to learn it off by heart, using some actions to help us remember the key words and phrases. After we could retell it confidently, we knew that we were ready to innovate the story (make it our own). We were incredibly proud of the stories we wrote.

In Summer 2, we began our work on dragons. We loved reading the story **'Kassim and the Greedy Dragon'** and produced some fantastic pieces of writing which we were very proud of.















3A 2020-2021

Autumn

The beginning of the school year seems a million miles away, in fact, we started in the Stone Age. We explored many aspects of Stone Age life through the Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic eras and the changes that accompanied these. We took a virtual tour around the Stone Age village of Skara Brae, looking at Stone Age artefacts and features of homes. To really get a feel for Stone Age life and to immerse ourselves in the topic, we got our forest school heads on and went on a scavenger hunt. We gathered sticks, vines and stones, and back in the classroom, we carefully constructed our Stone Age spears. Following this, we used clay and Stone Age designs to make beaker pots and even had a go at some cave paintings.

Later on, we were introduced to Otzi the iceman. Otzi was discovered frozen in a glacier, from the Stone Age, on the Otztal Alps. As we delved further into this magnificent find, we came to the shocking realisation, that we had stumbled upon a prehistoric, Stone Age murder. We used this to inspire our writing and put our detective heads on to write our own Otzi murder mystery stories.

Spring

The Spring term was not at all what we were anticipating, with learning being completed online and the children staying at home. However, through the power of the internet and team spirit, we managed to accompany a boy called Ivan on his journey to the 'Ice Palace' to rescue his brother. This kickstarted our 'Land of Fire and Ice' topic and we then travelled to the fascinating country of Iceland. We created tourist information brochures full of facts about treacherous volcanoes and glistening glaciers, which then inspired our hot and cold art project.


In Spring 2, we journeyed further into the depths of the Arctic Circle with Jan Welzl in the book 'A small tall tale from the far Far North'. We were lucky to have a visit from Matthew Bellwood who brought the Nordic Tale of 'Lemminkainen' to life with drama, costumes, songs and shadow puppets. On a second visit from Matthew and Mr Fotheringham from the National Geographic society, we were informed that there had been an important discovery on the Moor Allerton tundra. We sewed a pair of mittens to wear and packed our sled with all the essential items. On our way, we discovered an abandoned Inuit campsite and ran important Geographical tests on a meteor. Back in the classroom, we used this adventure to inspire our 'Talk for Writing' innovative stories. We explored the wonder of the Aurora Borealis and through tie dye and sewing, recreated our own versions of the natural phenomena.



Summer

Our Summer term started rather marvellously, with our George's Marvellous Medicine topic. We explored the world of Roald Dahl and wrote onomatopoeia poems using vocabulary extracted from the book. The children loved the wacky and wonderful ingredients that George used to cure his grisly of grunion of a Grandma. In fact, they were so inspired, that through the power of Talk for Writing, they wrote their own innovated stories, creating their own marvellous medicines to cure their teacher! The children put a lot of thought and effort into these and really had their chance to shine in their 'show what you know' writes.

To start our new History topic, we went orienteering around the school grounds to find clues. We brought them back to the classroom and pieced together a picture of Queen Victoria. We delved into our Victorian topic and researched what life was like for the rich and poor and Victorian monuments that can still be seen in Leeds today. However, nothing quite brought our Victorian topic to life, like our Victorian school day. The children dressed as Victorian children, chimney sweeps and street urchins and immersed themselves in what school life would have been like. They took part in PE lessons, learnt about Victorian punishments and even ate potato peel soup! At the end of the day, the children were very happy to return to modern day school life!

What a year we have had!

Autumn Term

We kicked off Year 3 with our Stone Age topic travelling millions (yes that's right millions) of years back to the first man. Throughout the topic we studied the three periods, Palaeolithic, Mesolithic and Neolithic looking carefully at the changes which occurred throughout each. Spring 2

This term our topic was 'Land of Fire and Ice' where we studied the contrasting country Iceland! We located it's whereabouts on the map in Geography, created some hot and cold colour palettes in Art , created our very own tie-dye Aurora Borealis and researched volcanic eruptions.

Our writing this term was led by Matthew Bellwood who came in to tell us a Nordic Folk Tale of Lemminkainen and took us on an Arctic Expedition where we came across a friendly

Polar Bear. We made mittens in DT in preparation for the treacherous journey!

To kick start this term we went orienteering around school to find

clues for our History topic. When we pieced them together we discovered it was a portrait of Queen Victoria! Throughout History we studied the Industrial Revolution during Queen Vitoria's reign, the impact she had and the difference in life then, compared to now. We even had our very own Victorian Day where we got to experience what it was like to be a Victorian child including the workhouse!

This year 3S have shown how adaptable and resilient they can be. They have risen to the challenge of learning both in class and online and have really done themselves proud. Below is a brief summary of the highlights of our year.

<u>Autumn</u>


Spring 2

In a later visit, drawing from the book "A small tale from the far far north", Matthew led us on our own Arctic expedition where we found a friendly polar bear and a deserted Inuit campsite. Finally, we found the meteor we set out to sample. Luckily, we had made our own mittens because the Moortown Tundra was rather chilly!

The return to school also meant we could continue where we left off with chess, PE and science. Subjects we had really missed during lockdown.





Summer

Summer saw another journey through time for 3S when we explored the Victorian era. We studied the industrial revolution during Queen Victoria's reign and the impact this had on the lives of the rich and poor in Leeds. We solved the mystery of the Seven Arches Viaduct, which was only in use for less than 24 years. We also learnt about Pablo Fanque, a famous circus owner, adapting his advertisement styles to produce our own posters.

On our Victorian day, pupils firstly experienced what life was like in the factories with some creative use of PE equipment. They were not happy to see the factory owners enjoying tea, sandwiches and Battenberg while they ate bread, 'dripping' and potato parings. Next they experienced Victorian school and while this was an improvement I think they preferred the modern Mr Spink to the Victorian version.

Queen Victoria was the first ruling Monarch to make the trip to our great city sending the people of Leeds into a frenzy. In many ways Year 3 caught the fever too; loving this new topic which is definitely here to stay!

Autumn 1 - A Tale of Two Sides

4K came into Year 4 having not been in school since March the previous school year. Despite this long time away from school, the class settled in very quickly, eager to get back to their routines and learning about a range of topics. We started our year of activism learning about Malala, an inspirational young Pakistani girl, who has fought hard for girls to have equal education opportunities. The children instantly connected with this topic and were very passionate when writing speeches about the issues we had discussed. This led to many effective debates and the children building confidence in public speaking, as well as sharing opinions in a useful and informative way. We finished off the first half term looking into the concept of different perspectives, with *Voices in the Park* by Anthony Browne supporting this learning. The children really enjoyed acting out each role within this book.







Autumn 2 - The Romans are Coming!

In the second half of the Autumn term, 4K were extremely excited to start learning about the Romans. The children knew there were many exciting things to look forward to, such as the Roman battle at the end of term, as well as an exciting workshop with Matthew Bellwood. 4K were enthused whilst learning the history and development of the Roman Empire across many parts of the globe as well as learning about some of the many legacies that the Romans left behind. Adding to the excitement, 4K were nominated to play the role of the Celts in the final battle (the role they were hoping to have). This cross-curricular project, allowed 4K to apply skills learnt in Art, DT Drama, History and Computing all at once, as well as producing an excellent piece of recount writing about the dramatic battle. We were also lucky enough to use the outdoor pizza oven, with Mr Moore showing us the ropes.









Spring – Free to be me / Blue Planet

Unfortunately, the wind was taken out of our sails at the beginning of the Spring term, when the UK announced a third lockdown due to COVID-19. Despite this huge blow, the children were unbelievably resilient and adapted incredibly quickly to a new style of learning (home-learning). The children were able to effectively access many computer programs and tools in order to complete their learning. They also braved Google meets, where they would be challenged to communicate via camera and microphone, as opposed to our norma in-class activities. Whilst the children adapted very well to this 'new normal', they were eager to return to the classroom to continue our exciting journey through all the fantastic topics in Year 4.

During the first half of Spring term, we focused on the topic 'Free to be me' which we studied alongside the children's novel *Bill's New Frock* by Anne Fine. The children yet again put their activist skills to the test fighting against gender stereotypes and understanding that everybody should have the opportunity to be themselves. Following this topic, we moved onto 'Blue Planet', which the children really enjoyed, combining Science, Geography and Writing to produce inspiring non-chronological reports. They also developed their Design and Technology skills, by creating and building sea creatures out of recycled materials - a very messy, but fun day!



Thankfully, the Summer term went ahead as scheduled and we were able to get stuck into the classic novel Moby Dick, adapted for children by Geraldine McCaughrean. The original story was written in the 1850s, but this did not stop the children from fully immersing themselves in this famous tale about a huge white whale that had bitten off the infamous Captain Ahab's leg. After learning most of Chapter 1 from memory, the children were able to recite the beginning of the story by heart, using excellent actions to help guide them. The children also put their computing skills to the test this half-term, by creating multimedia iMovies about the history of whaling. 4K certainly have a lot of tech skills!

Last, but certainly not least, we started our Anglo-Saxon and Vikings topic, which after the Romans, was a topic that the children were really looking forward to. To begin with, we studied the legend of Beowulf, and then innovated this story to make it our own. Next, we looked at how the Anglo-Saxons settled in Britain, as well as how the Vikings were able to invade and take over most of Britain by 1066, when the Battle of Hastings occurred. Overall, this class have had a challenging year, but their resilience has shone through, leading to even more effective and conscientious learning. Well done all of you!

4M have shown us how adaptable they can be this year. With an ever-changing environment due to COVID-19 restrictions and lockdowns, they have risen to the challenge of learning both in class and online

The autumn term was focused on the over-arching theme of 'A Tale of Two Sides' where children looked at events or situations from different perspectives. Children were inspired to find out about people who challenge stereotypes and stand up for what they believe in. Malala Yousafzai provided a great opportunity for children to research about girls' education around the world, they found out about what it meant to be an advocate for change, and then structured their own biographies based on this remarkable woman.



In the second half of the autumn term, the long awaited Roman battle preparations finally arrived. But first, we needed to find out what it meant to be a Roman. We welcomed Matthew Bellwood into school to complete an immersive workshop based on the 'Festival of Saturnalia' and children were able to dress up as Romans themselves. Children were all given a different role in Roman society and used role-play to reconstruct parts of the festival from celebrating on the street, to attending a gladiator battle and learning about the Roman Gods and Goddesses in the temple. Children learnt how to use Microsoft Sway to complete their online learning, attended Google Meets online and joined their year group peers in weekly assemblies, helping everyone to stay connected as much as possible in the circumstances. We can't go without saying a huge thank you also to the parents for supporting their children at home during these strange times too! I'm sure we will all look back in time with disbelief about how different our lives were for a period of time.

Towards the end of the spring term, we continued our efforts to become positive advocates for change, this time focusing on the global issue of plastic pollution. Greta Thunberg inspired us to write a speech to educate others about this grave problem, and David Attenborough provided us with lots of stimulus to write about through his *Blue Planet* series. "You are never too young to make a difference in this world!"









During the summer term, we dived straight into our 'Trials and Tribulations' topic, starting with a historical fiction text, Moby Dick. We used Talk for Writing techniques to learn a simplified version of the story off by heart. The children have really enjoyed story mapping the text, memorizing a text, giving it actions and performing it as a class together. This has really helped them to immerse themselves in the story and look at literary features a writer uses As we journeyed on, Beowolf took us towards our Anglo-Saxon topic. 





We have been lucky enough to explore Kathak dancing in workshops from the Balbir Dance








Science and the Humanities




Upon finishing our class novel, 'Letters from the Lighthouse', we were lucky enough to meet author Emma Carole and ask her all kinds or questions about the book.



Sketching large and allowing the pen to capture what the eyes saw proved hard for some of us, yet in letting go the autumnal scenes were created. Pastel, pencil crayon, charcoal, felt tip and watercolour were used sensitively to add colour.

A viewfinder helped us discover a great design within our drawing, which would become the lino print. Transferring the design from the tracing paper onto the lino was somewhat tedious, especially when intricate, but we all persevered. The lines were finally there for cutting into and or around.

By inking up a number of autumnal sky 'backgrounds' on the A5 lino, we reminded ourselves of the inking up process. We had also created a useful register for our lino printing. I was delighted to see Year 6 build up the layers of colour within their prints by cutting away some of their lino each time. If you look carefully, you will identify the trees/leaves within each design. Each print is unique and demonstrates incredible skill and patience.

An unexpected joy, was when a reception child inspired by the artwork she saw in her Read Write Inc sessions in the art studio, proceeded to create her own shoe in receptions' workshop. As a result, she was invited to join in the cobbling with Year 6 and with the support of their expertise created her own wedge shoe.

During Lockdown, the art studio saw the creations of plinth people. Plaster plinths were created and our colour self-portrait sculptures began to emerge.

One of the challenges was to make them dynamic as well as personal. What pose would you strike? From a 'stick-man' wire figure, the limbs, the torso and the head started to take shape. Strips of cotton sheet were wrapped around the wire figures and the muscle and skin of the sculpture formed. Dexterity was essential as well as perseverance and patience.

Finally, fabric was chosen to clothe the figure. Strips were wrapped round the sculpture and secured with knots and glue. Folding, pleating, braiding and even a pom-pom gave the clue to the identity of the sculpture.





Creating ACE Designers

Pupils at Allerton CofE Primary School have been using their creativity and problem solving skills to design, make and evaluate exciting and functional products. They have developed

their knowledge and understanding of textiles, structures, mechanisms and electrical systems.

This year in EYFS, the children have used their DT area to create imaginative products, from cameras, to a drink machine, and even a rocket. The children develop their oracy skills by explaining their innovations to the class.

During their topic about the Great Fire of London, Year 1 made
Tudor houses to recreate the fire in school. They explored how
to securely attach 2 cardboard boxes, strengthen them and use
buttresses to enable them to be free-standing.

Year 2 learnt about iconic bridges in Leeds, using this research to design their own bridges in groups. They created a prototype to experiment with different materials, shapes and joins, before measuring, sawing and gluing their wooden frames.

As part of their learning about Antarctic explorers, Year 3 designed and made mittens that would keep their hands warm on an expedition. They created templates, cut the material out and used a running stitch to sew them together.

Year 4 thought about how to cut and then join their materials when making Roman shields, horses and druid masks. They stiffened and decorated their products before using them to go into battle!

Year 5 used their understanding of cams, axles and frame structures to carefully plan and then create Egyptian themed moving toys.

Year 6 learnt about different frame structures and used this knowledge to build their own Anderson bomb shelters. They dropped heavy weights on the finished products to test them out.

Home Learning:

During lockdown, many pupils across school, embraced creative home learning tasks to plan and build a variety of different products, such as transport for explorers in Year 2.



Geography 2020/21


EYFS

EYFS have been using the Toilet Twinning to discuss differences between life in England and South Sudan. They have held discussions around their countries of origin and identified these on the map. The children have been looking at globes, flags and pictures of different countries. During lockdown, the children were encouraged to walk around their local area to see what they notice. They looked at road signs and street names.



Key Stage 1

Year 1- The children have completed map work on the UK and also looked at flags and the names of cities. During the Autumn term, they looked at famous landmarks in London and it's key geographical features. The children enjoyed looking at the different human and physical features around school and plotting a route walk on the map.





Key Stage 2

Year 3- Explored the Stone Age settlement of Skara Brae and Stone Henge. They identified the human and physical features of the UK and Iceland and created tourist information brochures.

Year 4- Explored human rights in different counties and colour coded on a map. They identified the countries invaded by the Romans, looked into underwater biomes, tracked and recorded Moby Dick and created models of the water cycle.

Year 5- Looked at Shakespeare's impact on British tourism and located different climate zones on the map. They explored the land use of NASA and looked at Egypt and the importance of the River Nile.

Year 6- Used 4 and 6- figure grid references and located Leeds and significant World War 2 locations. They explored different fossils, vegetation belts and Mayan settlements using a map.



History



Year 1 were intrigued to learn about The Great Fire of London and examine the changes in society as a result of this; they even made their own houses and tested them against the element of fire!

Year 2 discovered that Leeds was once known as Leodis and looked very different to how it does today, mainly down to the architect Cuthbert Broderick. After learning about the famous expeditions of Neil Armstrong and Captain Cook, the children were challenged to choose a famous explorer and research their lives and achievements.



Year 3 took themselves back to the Victorian Era when they held a Victorian day and experienced what it was like to be a child in this period of massive change. They were able to apply their historical skills from their previous topic which focused on what life was like between the Stone Age and Iron Age.

Year 4 had great fun exploring what life was like in Britain during the Roman times where they took to the battlefield and eagerly re-enacted the great battle between the Celts and Romans. They thoroughly enjoyed their visit from Mathew Bellwood, which provided a greater insight into what Roman life was like.













Upper Key Stage 2...

In UKS2, the children continued to develop their chronological understanding, focusing on Ancient civilisations. Year 5 delved deeply into the legacy of the Ancient Greeks and the achievements of the Ancient Egyptians. Lots of opportunities were provided to develop their source work and even complete the process of mummification!

Year 6 were captivated when learning about World War Two and the causes and consequences of the war. This topic also saw them celebrate VE day, where they got into the swing of the celebrations with a performance from The Red Canary Dance Band.






Maths Mornings



Year 4 had great fun during their Maths Morning, learning about crossing number boundaries, Roman numerals and rounding to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000!





This year, we have celebrated diversity in music through Musician of the Month. The project exposes children to a wide variety of music and allows them to appreciate music from different periods and cultures.






Oracy at ACE
